Monday, October 15th, marked the departure for Camp Dix of the thirty-one colored members of Company 1232 who arrived on May 24th. These were the men who re-enrolled for a second six months' in September, and were transferred to the east for re-assigment to companies in 2nd Corps Area. They were sorry to leave their western home and it was with genuine regret that the balance of the company saw them

They were, without exception a fine group of men.

It is seldom that a "mixed" company of whites and negroes gets along together as this company did during their stay here. The entire seven months was unmarred by one serious altercation between the two races -- not only because of thewas rictlotder published tagains frauthon. fighting, but because there was so little opportunity for friction. The colored boys entered into all phases of camp life -- socially, as well as in an athletic way, and the talents of the outstanding men among them were as readily recognized as they were among the white enrollees. For a considerable time, the kitchen crew was entirely

from "The-Cotton Club" and their work was done well.

It is impossible to successfully manage any group of men without requiring strict obedience to the few orders that make for orderliness instead of chaos. In this obcdience, the colored members of
this company established an enviable record and the discipling they
obeyed will be of benefit to them in later years. Man uncontrolled is the most dangerous thing in the world and the recognition of proper authority is the first step in acknowledging a controlled mind. By their respect for this order of things the colored boys won the respect of everyone in camp.

To whatever camp they may be assigned, we hope that the

"Cotton Club" will prosper.
