Gentlemen:

Reporting for the week ending June 2.

Sunday, May 27, I was at State Federation of Women's Club Park, Big Tree Park, in connection with the adoption of selection cutting on the area east of the park, a procedure which would certainly leave nothing of value for scenic purposes and very little value for protective purposes in connection with the Federated Park adjacent and the cost of destroying the slash which the Moyerhaeuser Timber Company claims would be an obligation upon the State would be prohibitive as compared with any value we would receive.

Monday and Tuesday, May 28 and 29, were spent in the office in Seattle.

Wednesday, May 30, I was at Rosario Beach Camp SP-4. The work on the right of way leading to the bridge site on the north side is progressing very rapidly.

Thursday, May 31, I was in Olympia and down to Millersylvania State Park. There are 51 negroes at Millersylvania Park and although they appear to be above the average in intelligence, it is unfortunate that we must have them at any park. Superintendent Sealey is developing a separate bathing beach for them and effort will be made to segregate them as much as possible. They are citizens, however, and it is quite necessary that we keep this in mind.

While in Olympia I conferred with the Purchasing Agent and gave him a requisition containing specifications for a pump to be used at the Waitsburg Park. I requested a pump that would furnish 25 gallons per minute which I believe will be adequate for both the north and south sides of the park. Mr. Burton has finished the plans for the pump house and the Purchasing Agent agreed to push the purchase of this pump just as rapidly as possible.

Through Dr. E. N. Hutchinson's investigations new office quarters were secured in the Lowman Building. Three rooms approximately 14 x 16
